

Dear Siblings In Christ ~

I pray this Newsletter finds you in the midst of summer joy, rest, and renewal. Have you had a chance to breathe in the beauty of God's creation? Have you taken time to be a human *BE*-ing, present to the moment at hand while resisting the urge to do, to go, to work, to prove, etc.

The very God who shaped the cosmos with the sun and moon gave the rhythm of day and night. Our Creator God rested and continually invites us to do the same. Sabbath is more than attending church on Sunday morning. Practicing Sabbath is a way of life. The practice of the Sabbath is counter-cultural because its purpose and meaning come from something other than what you can earn, accomplish, purchase, harvest, or check off your to-do list.

Sabbath reminds us that we are fully loved by God, given an abundant life in Christ, we are given the fullness of creation through painted sunsets, the shade of a tree, the smell of a campfire, the chipping of the birds, and more. Why wouldn't we want to bask in the routine and rhythm of the Sabbath—present to the gift of life as receivers of God's abundant grace?

For me, I have come to see Sabbath is not natural. It takes practice, it takes purpose, it takes faithful trust, and it takes letting go. The hardest to admit of it all is the risk of being honest with myself that I cannot do it all. It brings about an awareness that I might let others down. Ultimately when I lose sight of a Sabbath rhythm, I become unhealthy and run myself straight into burnout. (Burn our is not uncommon for Clergy, ministry leaders, those in health care, and other social services.)

This summer, I have recommitted to a purposeful rhythm of Sabbath. It means I must say no to some things to say yes to rest. It means I have to admit I can't do it all. I don't like to admit that, and sharing this with you gives me a feeling of vulnerability I would rather hide. However, ministering through Covid years, the closing of Highland, and the deep grief of numerous funerals in our parish, came to the experience of total exhaustion and burnout. It all caught up with me. Returning to practices of Sabbath (rest, prayer, work/life balance, self-reflection/honesty, seeking help and guidance from my Spiritual Director) is re-centering me. I am sharing, to be honest, with the hopes that it will meet you in your practice/s of Sabbath. I am sharing to walk in my pastoral talk.

Sharing our vulnerabilities invites us as a community of faith to share not only our joys but to be real with our struggles too.

May God bless and keep you, and may you encounter the power and presence of the Holy Spirit as you discover, practice, and live into the gift of the Sabbath. Amen!

Rest Is Resistance: A Manifesto by: Tricia Hersey I am excited to share that in just a few weeks, I will embark on a Pilgrimage to Assisi, Italy, following in the footsteps of St. Francis and St. Clare. I was drawn to St. Francis's life and teaching early in my spiritual development. Many of my faith leaders were Franciscan priests. I felt akin to St. Francis through the way he spoke about knowing God through creation and Christ through service and love.

In 2015, I was gifted a book by a friend who happens to be a Franciscan Lutheran Pastor. (Yep, they exist, and you might remember Brother Jeff as a guest speaker at our parish several years ago.) The book he gave me was called "Eager to Love: The Alternative Way of Francis of Assisi, by Father Richard Rohr. I was captivated by St. Francis's life and his unique partnership with St. Clare. Last summer, I was chatting with my friend and colleague, Pastor Sarah Raymond, about my admiration for St. Francis, to which She shared that she would be offering a pilgrimage to Assis in 2023.

Here's a little information about what a pilgrimage is: "Going on a religious pilgrimage is an ancient way of deepening

one's spirituality by traveling to a place associated with a holy person. It can be a deeply moving and powerful

encounter. Pilgrims are not tourists, pilgrims are people on a journey designed to take them outside their everyday, familiar lives into an unfamiliar environment, where they can encounter the extraordinary and experience God in a new way" This Pilgrimage to Rome and Assisi offers participants a chance to reflect on and learn from the vision and values of St. Francis and St. Clare of Assisi--including time for reflection, study, conversation, leisure, and visits to sacred Franciscan places in Assisi and Rome. In an effort to broaden and enrich our understanding of the Franciscan values that are the



foundation for the ministry done by Franciscan friars, sisters, and lay people, this pilgrimage to Assisi and Rome will expand participants' appreciation and increase their spiritual growth in the following areas: peacemaking, reverence for creation, and compassion for the poor." (Walk In My Shoes, Brother Paul O'Keeffe)

This pilgrimage is part Continuing education, part Sabbath, and I will also add some vacation time with an additional visit to London. We are traveling with Sunlight Tours, and our group is around 10-12 people, including my mom. (A surprise addition, after hearing what I would be doing, she was compelled to join in.)

I wish to thank the parish for honoring the importance of continuing education by supporting my time away and paying a portion of the cost of this pilgrimage. Last Fall, Parish leadership approved utilizing continuing education dollars from the 2022 and 2023 budgets equaling \$2000 towards the \$3500 Pilgrimage cost.



congregations a framework for supporting their Pastor's participation in Continuing Education. "The Lutheran Church has a history of an educated and well-trained staff. The congregation should expect their rostered ministers to be involved in continuing education programs that will provide opportunities for personal development, enrichment of devotional life, and growth in effectiveness and competency. Continuing education should be regarded as an essential ongoing process which assists in maintaining and sharpening the professional skills required in a rapidly changing world. Continuing education is understood to be "professional growth" and "self-renewal" as distinguished from program development, vacation, or synodsponsored learning, It is also recommended a minimum of two weeks and two Sundays of continuing education time be allowed for rostered ministers.

Dear Friends in Christ,

Greetings! I hope this newsletter article finds you well and enjoying the beautiful summer weather. I write this article sitting in the backyard of a friend's house, reminiscing on the 2023 Eastern North Dakota Synod Assembly, which was held in early June at the Holiday Inn in Fargo.

Annually, members of the Eastern North Dakota Synod gather for an Assembly, where we delve into scripture, worship and the business of the Eastern North Dakota Synod. This year, the 36<sup>th</sup> annual Synod Assembly

gathered under the theme of 'Equip.'

I, along with 293 others, including Susie and Larry Kuster, Krista Gunderson and Pastor Rachael Puttbrese, took part in the assembly, including electing a new Eastern North Dakota Synod Vice President.

Saturday morning began with worship, with Bishop Tessa Moon Leiseth presiding, followed by a day full of fun and adventures. In the afternoon, we heard about the State of the ELCA, from Rev. Lamont Wells, the Executive Director of the Network of ELCA Colleges and Universities. On Saturday evening, I attended the Food For All Block Party, which raised more than \$3,000 for food ministries across our Eastern North Dakota Synod. Sunday morning began with the third and final plenary, which included elections. I'm proud to say that two of us from the Central Valley Parish, Pastor Rachael Puttbrese and I, were elected and will serve on the Synod Council for the upcoming term.

In the third plenary, the 2023 Mission Plan was adopted. I mention this because it's basically the budget for the Eastern North Dakota Synod. This year's budget, passed at the Assembly, shows a projected deficit of about \$48,000. The Eastern North Dakota Synod Council will be constantly evaluating the Mission Plan over the year, making adjustments as needed.

Offerings were taken throughout the weekend at the worship services, and I'm proud to say that those in attendance gave just shy of \$12,000, which will be split among the two bible camps in our Synod – Red Willow (Binford) and Park River Bible Camp (Park River) – and the two campus ministries in our Synod – Christus Rex (UND - Grand Forks) and Crossroads (NDSU – Fargo).

I appreciate the support of the Central Valley Parish in allowing me to, once again, attend the Eastern North Dakota Synod Assembly this year.

Thank you for giving us the opportunity to represent Reynolds Lutheran Church. It was an honor.



We then added the capability to use the camera and sound system directly to the live Facebook feed. As our live broadcasts continued, we saw the need to expand our coverage. We had a new camera on our wish list that could give us different views along with new mics for better sound. We started a Tech Fund that many gave memorials and donations to.




